One of the main things I have learned is that the time is past for "walking on eggshells" in my crosscultural relationships. I have too often felt hesitant, afraid of saying the wrong thing or doing something to hurt a person of color. Instead, I am learning to take risks and do what it takes to connect across racial barriers. While it is hard to risk hurting someone or looking stupid, I am realizing that the only way I will be able to have any real friendships with people who are different from me is to be able to take such risks. When I do hurt someone, I'll need to have courage to say, "I'm sorry; will you help me to change?" — both to my friend and to God.

through into the new year. This "break" affords me an opportunity to work on plans for the next quarter, to receive further training, and to reflect once again on what God has been doing on campus during the fall. Here are just a few of the tasks I hope to tackle during December and early January:

Regional meetings. Staff from our region will be gathering Dec 10-13 to restructure our Chapter Focus Week training (once known as "chapter camp"). I will be on a team covering exposition, "retreats of silence," and sabbath rest. We hope to listen to God and make changes to our programs in order to serve students better.

I continue to ask God for help as these plans take shape. We need his help so deeply in all that we do.

Fund development. Due to natural donor attrition and our country's economic

downturn, I have recently lost some financial support. I trust that God will provide for my needs, but I also know that in order for him to provide I need to ask people. I am eager to see what God will do on this front.

Winterfest preparation. At our annual "Winterfest" student training conference (Feb. 22–24 this year), I will be teaching manuscript Bible study methods, using the book of Ruth as our text. I have been studying this book for some time, and it is fascinating! The story is rich with issues such as God's provision, justice, relationships between the sexes, and obedience. In December, I will spend more time in study and also begin outlining the shape of that weekend.

National Staff Conference. All InterVarsity staff in the U.S. will be gathering in Orlando, Florida, in early January for our every-three-years conference. Jon and I will both be there. I hope to connect with other staff in the nation to glean wisdom from them, and to attend some of the seminars on various topics.

Vacation! Bill & Betty Boyd, Jon's parents, have generously invited us to go to London with them to help lead a group theater trip. We will be gone for a week right after Christmas. Jon is especially excited to show me around the city, since I've never been to London before. There are so many things I want to see, I need to start studying now!
